- Capable?

## Step 2. Work With and Through Your Company

- Tell the project manager
- Get other tech experts excited
- Get Legal on board
- Follow company policy (You do have one, right?)
- Use your download service (You do have one, right?)

## Step 3. Give Back

- Bug reports
- Documentation
- Contribute code

#### What NOT to Do

- Go solo, just put the f\*\*\* code into your project and don't tell anyone
- "It's too big, so I'll just put it on a USB drive and plug it into my work computer. What could go wrong?" (viruses, malware)
- Use restricted code "just for now"
